

From the President...Peter Benevento

Welcome back to Lake Carmi and the 2016 summer season. The LCCA Board of Directors has been working hard on your behalf over the winter



and spring to bring you a full slate of fun summer activities and to advance our water quality goals.

The Celebrate Lake Carmi events are being finalized for the 4th of July holiday and will be as spectacular as ever. Light Up Lake Carmi will again begin the festivities and

will last throughout the weekend. The pirates lead by Captain Bushwacker will return prior to our Pontoon Boat Race and Fireworks. Later in the month the fifth Lake Carmi Cottage Tour will take place. Three sailfest events are also scheduled for the summer and the second annual Kayak Race is slated for early August. All in all a tasty menu for summer fun.

A striking difference in the lake this year is the water level which is unseasonably low. This was also an issue late last season with campers being concerned about getting their boats off their boat lift. The Mill Pond Dam controls the water level. Last fall the Franklin Selectboard initiated contact with VT DEC to develop stricter protocols for manipulating the dam and thereby the water level. This dialogue continues and we will report back to you when final.

Speaking of the Dam, the normal level of the lake is 435 feet above sea level which is the level of the lip of the dam. This level was originally marked on the side of the new outlet by the construction engineers. The mark however has unfortunately

faded. We will attempt to re-establish it so the variances in the lake level may be regularly monitored.

Another striking difference in the lake this year from last fall is the water clarity. The lake is quite clear which is normal for this time of year. A major LCCA goal is to see the lake stay this clear all summer. The LCCA has been actively engaged with the Lake Carmi TMDL Implementation Team seeking improvements in our watershed. A focus has been to determine the availability of Federal funds to assist with Lake Carmi watershed projects. The work of the Implementation Team was recently featured in an article in the St. Albans Messenger.

Norwich University has joined us in our water quality improvement efforts. Some senior engineering students have conducted phosphorus studies over the winter. Although their final report is not yet available, they did state their work is ongoing at Lake Carmi. We welcome their association with us.

Safety over the summer is always a priority and we have asked the Town to petition the State to lower the speed limit on Lake Road. The State has agreed to review the issue and hopefully we will have more information soon. Please observe the lake area speed limits especially near the north beach and Vic's Crossing.

As President one of the perks of this job is watching our dedicated volunteers work throughout the year for the benefit of Lake Carmi and the Town of Franklin. It is wonderful to watch truly talented folks accomplish so much for so many. This year is no different. We have residents from the Town and all the shores of Carmi contributing to our efforts. All of these people deserve our thanks and appreciation. They work for no pay. They only work for Lake Carmi.

Have a great start to the summer. See you around the lake!

New Corn Growing Technology

A new technology for spreading manure and growing corn on dairy farms is being adopted by neighboring farms in the Franklin Watershed. Manure is a major by-product of the milk business and necessary to grow the crops that feed the cows. For several years now, some of our Franklin farms have adopted technology to conserve the land and cut the costs of feed production.

One of the largest dairy farms in the Lake Carmi basin is the Benjamin Dairy Farm, based in East Franklin. The Benjamins now lease much of the farm land surrounding Lake Carmi and are using this new technology to lessen the environmental impact on the lake. Last fall they planted cover crops on their corn land to help control wind and water erosion over the fallow months. As this



photo illustrates, the corn land has a substantial green crop growing. The piece of equipment is injecting the manure directly into the soil, preventing agricultural runoff. This also provides better utilization of the manure by the corn plants being grown.

A few days after the manure injection, the corn planter came through and planted the crop without tillage of the soil. This no-till system is not new, but hasn't been used much in Franklin County until recent years. Following planting the producer then applies an herbicide to knock down the cover crop and allow the corn crop to grow without competition. This is a very positive step to help control pollution around Lake Carmi.

Camp Roads, What's the Problem?

Pollution from storm water runoff and soil erosion is a significant problems contributing to the decline in water quality at Lake Carmi. Soil erosion is one of the single largest pollutants (by volume) to our lake, and many of the erosion and sedimentation problems in watersheds originate from improper construction and maintenance of camp roads. Proper camp road maintenance helps prevent this form of pollution and preserves our splendid water resources.

Camp roads make changes in the natural storm water drainage patterns. These changes strip away the protective vegetative cover; creating a highly erodible exposed soils in the water-shed. Washing out ditches and roads sends pollutants directly into the lake, multiplying the problem several times.

Although there is no single cause for camp road problems, poor management of surface or groundwater is the most common cause. Before there were camps at Lake Carmi, circa 1900, surface water runoff created its own natural places to run and be filtered before it got to the lake. The very presence of the road diverts and concentrates runoff, placing it on surfaces that erode and add nutrients and waste to the water.

The problems on Lake Carmi roads are the same as on any dirt road. They are not properly constructed or maintained. Every camp road has a major problem with potholes, tire rutting, washouts and speed of the traveling vehicles. There are different causes in different seasons. Going slower on the road and avoiding the bad spots will not only make your road easier to maintain, but save the great investment you made in your vehicle.

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Birding with Debbie Bushey.....

As of mid-May she has identified the following birds here at Lake Carmi: Common Loon, Horned Grebe, Turkey Vulture, Turkeys, Osprey, American Kestrel, Barred Owl, Canada Goose, Mallard, Lesser Scaup, Ring-necked Duck, Common Goldeneye, Bufflehead, Hooded Merganser, Common Merganser, Ring-billed Gull, Mourning Dove, Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Downey & Hairy Woodpeckers, Northern Flicker, Eastern Phoebe, Blue Jay, American Crow, Common Raven, Tree Swallow, Black-capped Chickadee, Brown Creeper, White-breasted Nuthatch, Redbreasted Nuthatch, Robin, Starling, Northern Cardinal, White-throat Sparrow, American Tree Sparrow, House Sparrow, Song Sparrow, Darkeyed Junco, Red winged Blackbird, Bald Eagle, Common Grackle, Blue Heron, Catbird, Eastern Kingbird, King Fisher, Gold Finch, Norther Water Thrush, Northern Oriole, Ruby Throated Hummingbird, Ruby Crowned Kinglet, Ruffed

Grouse, Sharp-shined Hawk, Spotted Sand Piper and Yellow Warbler.



Debbie writes for June about becoming a birder. What do you need to start bird watching? Bird watching requires only a good field guide and a pair of binoculars, 7-8 power binoculars for all

around birding. Buy the best you can afford, try them out before you buy them. Seek out advice from a knowledgeable salesperson or another birder.

Sibley's Field Guide to Birds of Eastern North America is my choice of guides. It is designed to use in the field, but it is also worthwhile to spend time browsing the guide at home. You should become familiar with the names and appearances of common birds in your area. Most birders develop their own small reference library over time.

Finding birds is one of the greatest challenges of this hoppy. You must be alert and stealth, in order to find some birds. Be aware of your surroundings and what the birds are doing. If you have good luck at one location, make a point of going there again. Pay attention to weather and habitat. Are the birds attracted to an area because it is sheltered from harsh weather conditions? Does the site provide water, food or some other scarce resource? Paying attention to where and when you see certain birds will help you develop the ability to predict sightings and put you in the best position to find those species in the future.

Watch for the second year bald eagle on Lake Carmi this season. Happy Birding.

Getting Ready for Fishing?



Get all the details, prices, rules and much more. Most importantly it's easy. Not even any postage. Any person engaged in fishing, hunting or taking of any wild animals must be properly licensed. We often see the game warden on Lake Carmi checking licenses; anyone can apply for a fishing license. There is no requirement for a previous fishing license. If you are purchasing a short term fishing license, make sure you select the day you plan to start fishing, it is only good for the dates on the permit. Term fishing licenses are for consecutive days only.

June 11, 2016 is a free fishing day, no license is required for anyone, however all fishing laws and rules remain in force. At Lake Carmi that also means the walleye slot is in force. Open Season: First Saturday in May to March 15th each year.

Length Limit: Minimum length 15", 17" to 19" protected slot (all walleye between 17–19 inches must be released)

Daily Limit: 5 fish limit provided only 1 can be over 19 inches.

To get a resident fishing license any person has to have been a resident for more than six months immediately prior to applying for a license. The applicant cannot have claimed residency anywhere else during that time period. A non-resident student who is enrolled in a high school or college is eligible for a resident license.

Editorial by Larry Myott, Retired UVM Extension Agricultural Specialist.

Change has been coming to Vermont Agriculture for more years than I can remember, when I began work with the Vermont dairy industry there were over 12,000 dairy farms in the state, today there are about 900 producing dairy farms. During my nearly 30 years of work with the Vermont, national and international agricultural industry, including both dairy and maple production, the only thing that has stayed the same is there is always change.

The issues of the last couple years in our watershed are the result of not adopting change. Whether it be campers or agricultural producers, those problems could have been mitigated by adoption of change. Campers have adopted change; septic systems have been replaced at a fairly rapid rate. Streambank erosion control is a constant topic; road erosion at the lake is a major topic now.

As technology is adopted by the players, we know the pollution problems are better understood by those players. Even those players called bureaucrats in state government, the legislators, and the local public servants too, are looking forward to solutions. The legislators took action and required the bureaucrats to enforce that action; Now the rules are to being enforced. The same issues, if followed by the players around Lake Carmi, will bring enforcement to repair the damage here. Although not a short-term solution, it is a start to a better future of water quality.

Not accepting the do nothing attitudes of the past is the only way we can make progress. Just recently the Secretary of the Vermont Agency of Agriculture and the Secretary of Agency of Natural Resources came to Franklin to discuss the most recent rules and the enforcement actions coming down the road. Getting to sit at the same table and interact with the bureaucrats is a step in the right direction.

As we see the rules of better water quality being violated, we are told by the enforcement folks, we need to take action. Getting enforcement in the past has been very difficult, hopefully the bureaucratic language is real this time. Our action is to make sure the rules are known to everyone, both campers and agricultural producers. We also need to thank those who are doing the right thing. We need to recognize the good things that are happening with all our neighbors and yes, say thank you!

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
